# Using Photovoice and Facebook as Tools for Heritage Education in Jamaica: The Case of Buff Bay

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
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#### Research Problem

There is a need to develop a comprehensive heritage education programme in Jamaica in order to fill existing gaps in the knowledge of Jamaica's heritage sites.

# **Knowledge Gaps**

- The Jamaica National Heritage Trust has had plans since the 1990s for an islandwide inventory of built and archaeological sites, but has not been implemented due to a lack of funds. (Grant, 2013).
- Suggested that the public provide photographs to the JNHT of heritage sites that they are familiar, which requires a co-ordinated, island-wide community-based project.
- Only 5-10% of Jamaica has been surveyed over the past 7 years in terms of locating historical/cultural sites in Jamaica (Griffiths & Emmanuel, 2005).



St. George's Anglican Church in Buff Bay traces its origin to 1802 and the existing structure was completed in 1859.

# Aim & Objectives

- This research explores the feasibility of using the participatory action research method Photovoice and the social media platform Facebook as heritage education tools.
- To educate community residents of how heritage sites in their community can potentially provide employment through heritage tourism and utilising specialized conservation and maintenance skills.
- To increase the inventory of Jamaica's heritage sites.




# Study Area: Buff Bay & the Buff Bay Valley

- In the buffer zone of the Blue & John Crow Mountains, declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2015.
- High poverty levels due to high dependence on farming.



# **Poverty Levels in Buff Bay**



- Most persons living in the Buff Bay valley fall below Jamaica's poverty line.
- Poverty levels become more severe moving up the valley and away from Buff Bay. (Wright, 2002)

#### **Research Questions**

- 1. How effective is the Photovoice methodology in filling students' knowledge gaps of heritage sites in their community?
- 2. How effective is Facebook as a educational platform in filling students' knowledge gaps of the heritage sites in their community?

#### **PhotoVoice**

- Conceptualized by Caroline Wang and Mary Ann Burris as a participatory needs assessment tool, to learn about women's public health issues in Yunnan, China (Wang & Burris, 1997).
- Photovoice methodology (Cook & Quigley, 2013) involves:
  - 1. Using cameras to document community conditions and issues;
  - 2. Writing narratives about these issues;
  - 3. Discussing the findings within community groups and
  - 4. Meeting and informing policy makers about the issues and the findings.

#### Photovoice & Facebook

- Rubrico, J. G. U., & Hashim, F. (2014) used both to empower non-native preservice English language teachers in Malaysia.
- They found Facebook "a convenient interface for student engagement, facilitating interactive exchanges that bring about conceptual understanding and intellectual discourse". (23).

# Methodology

- Grade nine (3<sup>rd</sup> form) students of the Buff Bay High School were selected as participatory action researchers. Selected as this is when students choose their area of specialisation.
- Total school population of 793, with 178 Grade nine students.
- 101 Grade nine students were available to participate.
- Questionnaires were administered before and after the research activities to measure changes in perceptions and attitudes towards the heritage sites.
- Workshops held with students on built heritage conservation, community tourism and documentary photography.
- Field class held to identify, document and photograph heritage sites within the study zone, leading to discussions.










# Issues Identified - Digital Divide


#### **Internet Access at Home**

#### **Issues Identified – Photovoice Activities**

#### Weaknesses in undertaking the Photovoice activities

- 1. Photographs with detailed captions are not uploaded to Facebook.
- 2. Well written and detailed narratives concerning their findings and thoughts are not included.
- 3. Meaningful discussions among the students of the findings needs to take place.
- 4. Policy and decision makers from the relevant agencies need to be incorporated and give their input about the issues raised.

#### **Issues Identified - Facebook**

- Facebook is a useful platform to host online resources and references.
- Students need to post their findings to the project page.
- Can students and teachers see Facebook as an educational platform?

#### Issues to be Addressed

- Is the use of FB feasible in rural Jamaica due to the digital divide?
- Are the Grade 9 students able to undertake all of the tasks required to be a participatory action researcher?
- Increase the time spent with the students to ensure that all Photovoice steps are completed.
- Increase the incorporation of policy-makers at the community and national level, regarding skills training, tourism development and heritage conservation.
